We made our circle in such a way that to incorporate my mom's grave in the circle with us and I was able to stand in Blot by her side. I can't do it justice and I can't share the feeling, but I do want to share that it was extremely special for me, and my soul is better for it.

Lots of us had "the magic" happen at Winter Nights this year.



With the rich colors of autumn with its sights and smells, it's easier to dip into our ancestral past and imagine the lives of our forebears. Our Gythias play a special role in this as they lead us in blot to our Mothers at Winter Nights. We enter the circle where we stand shoulder to shoulder. And yet the goal of the Disablot is the thread that connects us to the other side. With eyes closed, we call the name of one of our Mothers. We sense the veil just beyond us and feel it quiver to our words.

Mothers All! We sing to you. We sing to your sons. We kuln among the women, calling to our Folk. We honor all the Holy Powers and give our gifts. Then it is our turn to receive our gifts from you.

Excitement grew, like the anticipation of a child at Yule. At Óðinshof, each murmured-message to a Mother was answered with a rune drawn from a box... Something to guide, to comfort, to teach -- all given by the Mothers with a touch of love. My own rune, taken last in the darkness, was Ingwaz.

Ingwaz? Such a small and simple rune. And yet, I came home with a sense of fulfillment and energy I haven't experienced in a long while.



Ingwaz? Since then, it has been like an egg cracked open. New ideas and creativity are



Alan Wittenberg was a long-time member of the Asatru Folk Assembly and a good friend. He was born in Missoula, Montana on July 2nd in the year 1949.

His father was a stone mason and scholar, preserving a tradition of his family that went back to Scandinavia. His mother lovingly cared for the hearth and raised him to be a kind and caring man.








For a time, Alan worked with his father and his Uncle Stanley Hendrickson, learning the family trade. His work, and that of his family's, can be seen throughout Missoula.

Alan was part of two rock bands during his life. He played with Intripid and the Klassics.

He was a green thumb, and had a very healthy garden where he grew vegetables and flowers alike.

But Alan's true calling was the family occupation of scholar. Alan was witty and a brilliant writer. His sense of humor and the joy he found in this world filled volumes of his work as he studied the mysteries of the Runes.





Alan can be best described as a seeker. His thirst for knowledge set him on the Odinic path decades ago and his work primarily focused on runic knowledge and mysteries.

His work is being cataloged and preserved by the Odinic Order of the Ulfhednar, of which he was involved with as the Hall's Patron Hero. Now in his passing, the Hall remembers him and honors him by preserving his legacy.



More important than his involvement with the Hall, he was a long time AFA member and once told me that his favorite part of the month was getting *The Runestone*. Alan was far too remote to be able to make it to the hofs but his constant support dated back to the Asatru Free Assembly days. In later years, thanks to technological improvements, he became much more involved. I will never forget that we held his first group Blot together or the joy he professed during his first Sumbel.

Alan received last rites in the form of the final Wayfarer's Blot surrounded by his loving family and afa members. Alan was perfectly lucid for the blot where he was honored by those who loved him and where he was presented with beautiful grave goods.

Alan passed with a smile on his face listening to Hemkomst ready to meet his ancestors.





AFA Homeschool Program







Day of Remembrance

Queen Sigríð of Sweden | November 9



Though little information of Sigrid, Queen of Sweden, exists in a historical text, the stories abound. Born a Swedish noblewoman Sigrid married Erik the Victorious and together they had one son. She became the Regent after the king's death, and it wasn't long before her vast wealth drew out all of the suitors, one of whom was her own foster brother.

Tired of the constant suitors, and very aware of poor manners, it is said that Sigrid invited her foster brother and another suitor to a feast only to light the building on fire and lock them inside. This didn't scare away the Christian Tyrant, Olaf Tryggvason. She might have entertained his proposal, but when he demanded that she convert to Christianity to wed him, Sigrid immediately turned him away. This enraged Tryggvason so much that he first insulted her age and beauty, and then slapped her. The story says she then told him that his behavior very well might lead to his death.

It was not long before Sigrid united Sweden with Denmark by marrying King Sweyn Forkbeard. Already feuding with Olaf, it didn't take much for Sigrid to convince her new husband to go to war. This led to one of the largest ancient maritime battles, the Battle of Swold, in which Olaf Tryggvason was killed.

What can we learn from this story?

While we can't run around burning to death the people that annoy us, we can take a stand for ourselves and our Folk. We have the right to defend ourselves and our dignity from those who would try to dimmish us. And when we all work together as a cohesive group so much can be done to defend and raise our Folk up.



Holiday

Feast of the Einherjar | November 11 (Observed November 18)



One of the most recognizable motifs in Asatru is that of the Viking warrior. Helm, sword, beard, and blood: boys and girls have long been mesmerized by the stories of Valkyries and the eternal feasting and fighting of the Einherjar in Odin's Hall, Valhalla. Pop culture has taken the Berserker and the Valkyrie and remade them hundreds of times.

Our ancestors lived in a different time, when fighting wars and general "viking" was necessary for survival. For a warrior, to die in battle was the greatest honor. Today, war is not necessary in the same way. Most people scoff at war, urge their children to "do better" or "be better". For those of us who practice Asatru, however, we recognize the importance and the value of the warrior. More important still, is the importance and the value of those who have fallen, the Einherjar.

Once a year we set aside a day specifically to honor the Einherjar. We raise a horn to the fallen warriors to thank them for fighting for our people and our freedom. One way to celebrate is to set a place at the table for the Einherjar. Serve them the same food you are eating for dinner. Pour them a glass of wine or beer. When you are done, leave the plate outside under a special tree in offering. Another way to celebrate would be to visit the graves of veterans at a local cemetery and help to clean them up. Leave some decorations or a small flag.

You don't have to have any veterans in your immediate family. It is a guarantee that somewhere down your ancestral lines you have family who fought in war, and most as

likely, that some of them didn't return from the front lines. It is in your blood. So, raise that horn, and raise it high. Remember our fallen.

Sumbel was heartfelt and powerful, but you must have been there to know the words poured into the Well.



On Sunday morning after sausage and cheese grits prepared Folkbuilder Joyner, Witan Brandy led the Folk in a Wayfarer's Blot to Frigga reminding us to bring home the energy we built on this holy weekend.




The hike to the top of the location of the future Hof is beautiful. While it does take effort, the experience itself as a lead up to a sacred ritual prepares you in a very powerful way.





Cooking for our Folk



Cooking from the Heart. One of the first chefs I worked for told me that there are two main rules to cooking.

- 1. ALWAYS cook from the heart!
- 2. You must know the why of the rule before you can think about breaking it.

To this day, I still believe that number one is the most important; but two is the most valuable lesson. So, for example: why would you add flour to the mix when are you making Fried Potato balls? It doesn't add anything to the dish overall and in fact, it takes away flavor and disrupts texture. The reason is that what flour takes away: is moisture. It adds to the binder and liquid consumption.

So, what does this mean for the folk? Plan and simply don't take shortcuts. Whenever I pick up the knife and began cooking for the folk, I think of it as channeling the ancestors. Cooking reminds me of that age-old musing "I don't measure seasoning; I wait for the tap on the shoulder from the ancestors to tell me that's enough."

When you cook from the heart, people can tell. Don't cook out of spite or obligation. Cook for the folk because you want to! Find new recipes. Test them. Make them better. And when your heart tells you it is right...time to serve. If you have never made cookies from scratch...make them. Why not? Use the best ingredients you can afford (don't take out a second mortgage for this) but be proud to feed the folk.

The importance of this AFA Prison Ministry is so much more than just for those who are actually incarcerated, it benefits not only them as followers of Asatru but their families and loved ones on the outside as they will see the noticeable change in their demeanor and demand that our faith commands for them to lead a noble life. We all are future ancestors and will help them be examples of our faith and not be a burden or a product of recidivism.

We are compiling letters from prisoners that are Educational, Empowering, and Encouraging along with special spiritual writings from our Gothar to create a quarterly newsletter to be distributed to inmates, institutions, and jails. Our mission is not about providing free books or literature to bored prisoners who simply want free stuff. We intend on making real-world change for the better of our folk.

""No packed rooms in the prisons; in each institution I have only a few people; occasionally about a dozen, but 5-6 is more common. I certainly do not want the Fellowship to be a club for cons, or ex-cons; the advantage is that when in prison the inmates have time to discuss and digest what they read, a point that often is lost to people on the outside in the hubbub of daily concerns" - Else Christensen

By the example of our Folkmother, Else Christensen, we will also be going into prisons as we are able to. Some of our Gothar and other leadership, will be going into the prisons to hold study groups, lead blot, and encourage continued growth in the folk inside.

Ancestral Food and Culture

Apfelkucken Recipe



An Autumn treat enjoyed with coffee breakfast, after supper for dessert, or even for a nice snack. Perfect for the leftover apple pickings. Enjoy this classic traditional German dish with your family and friends.

Apfelkucken 8 Granny Smith apples

- 4 thinly sliced
- 4 chopped
- 2 c granulated sugar
- 5 tbl granulated sugar
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 3 c all purpose flour
- $1 \frac{1}{2} \text{ tsp salt}$
- 1 1/2 baking soda
- 1 1/2 baking powder
- 6 eggs
- 1 c applesauce
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/3 c orange juice

Glaze:

- 1 1/2 c powdered sugar
- 2 tbl butter
- 1 tbl water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter to round cake pans, dust with flour, tap out excess flour.

Peel, core, and slice apples then place in bowl. Mix sugar and cinnamon toss evenly.

In a large mixing bowl combine flour, 2 c sugar, salt, baking soda and powder. Add eggs, applesauce, vanilla extract, and orange juice.


Fill bottom of each pan with batter, then layer with apple slices and chopped apples, and add remaining batter on top.

Bake for 1 hour, prick with toothpick to ensure its fully baked.

Mix glaze ingredients until smooth. Drizzle over cakes. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream on top or coffee.






remain anonymous, but remember that our immortality is in our names and stories being spoken by the folk!



Secondly, we remember our ancestors. We pay special respect to the Disir. We remember the sacrifices and hard work our forebears put in so that we might live and might have better lives than they did. It is impossible to calculate how far back our ancestral lines stretch, or to know how each of them approached parenthood, but one thing we can be certain of is that without the mothers and fathers that came before us we would not exist at all.

Thirdly, we recognize the thinning of the Veil. Our Ancestors are not necessarily always so far away as they may seem. During this time of the year, they draw ever nearer to us. They see us and know of us, and we must not disappoint them. This time of year is a wonderful opportunity to connect with those who came before us and give gifts to them in recognition of all they did for us.

Winter Nights in Baldrshof welcomed in the Autumnal changing of the seasons and the beginnings of the cold weather of the Midwest. While each of us must go on our own way forward into the new season, one thing which we all shared was the Frith we have built as a community and the common drive to be the best we can be not only for ourselves but for our Ancestral lines which we are all part of.

Winter Nights in Iowa

Ali and Emily went to the Villisca Ax Murder house for a tour, it was a few minutes away from Viking Lake State Park in Stanton, IA where Winter Nights was hosted. As the women folk were having their time, the men folk went on a hike to the shelter near the lake to have a talk about self-reliability and what it means to our folk. We talked about building their skills up, helping find the skills they thought they did not have, and talking about how by going to events you are building the community the folk are looking for. The Asatru Folk Assembly is the foundation for that community. Reach out to the folk first before going to outside sources. Later in the day, the campground was hosting a trick or treat event near the RV side where the kids got some goodies and the adults got some spooky drinks. There was a clown named Mr. Tickles, and Mr. Tickles is always out.



Later that night, Cody and Ali Clausen conducted beautiful blots to the alfar and Disir, respectively. Once the rituals were completed, we shared stories of our Alfar and Disir around the fire, then the men left for a 3/4-mile night hike along the hill trail. Making our way back we heard the women Kulning us to camp to prepare for sumbel. During Sumbel there were stories, songs, and poems shared by many Folk around the fire. A wonderful night of a spectacular weekend.



The next morning, we had a hearty steak and eggs breakfast to fuel us up for the tear down of camp and a 1.75 mile walk around most of the state park before we sat in our vehicles to drive the hours back home. That was a beautiful walk I will have to finish next year! Come out next year and see for yourself! This event has inspired others to get out in nature more often and to get out to meet more of our Folk! This was the First Winter Nights in Iowa and it will not be the last.

On Courage



As we make our way closer to the Feast of the Einherjar, that holy feast where we celebrate the warriors who fought and died for our folk, I would like to talk a little about courage, and what it means to be courageous.

What is courage? Is it charging valiantly into battle, without fear of what awaits you? For many, this might be the idea that comes to mind. But courage isn't a blind jump into the fray. I think of the friends and family that I have that are and were military members, and in all of the stories that I have heard told, one thing remains the same. When all is done and you ask "What was going through your mind when that happened?", the response is almost always "I was scared". And here we find the truth, courage is action in the face of fear. Courage is choosing fight over flight and harnessing that fear towards a victorious end.

The AFA has many members and leadership that were or still are service members. But for those of us who are not military, how can we apply these concepts to our own lives? When danger is not imminent, and most of us have the luxury of safety here at home? How can we honor our brothers and sisters that do go off to battle and fight for us, fight for their folk?

We honor them by showing the same traits they have shown us. Sometimes situations will present themselves to you, which you fear. This could be a new job, public speaking, an event you are in charge of hosting, there are many things we face in our day-to-day lives which will scare us. In these moments, we are presented with a choice. Do you back down and miss an opportunity because you are afraid of how it will turn

out? Or do you face it head on, in spite of that fear, and trust in the gods that it will work out the way it needs to?







Nebraska Pioneer Museum Moot




Nebraska was built by brave men and women who risked their lives in hopes of something more. With the veil thinning, we saw it fit to go and learn more about them.

Folk Art









We ended up going for a hike to the falls and shortly after held a Blot to Odin by the water with some awesome cinnamon mead made by a member. After leaving the park we met at a local pub and had some good food and conversation.



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Becoming Amma



Amma is the Icelandic word for Grandmother. In German, she is called, "Oma." The role of Grandmother to our ancestors was a respected one. This was a woman, who had experienced all the earlier phases of life and had raised her children to adulthood. She is the one who quietly keeps everything going in the background. Her focus goes beyond that of her own family, but to the tribe. She knows what is going on in the life of everyone within the tribe through intuition, observation, and life experience. She is a sharer of knowledge. Sharing and preserving the traditions of those who came before her.

A woman who remembers and reclaims her ancestral wisdom is unstoppable. There is an inherent magic that she discovers within herself; a rootedness, substance, and strength that fills her with a sense of who she is and who she may become. She connects into an ancient wisdom that is a part of her yet is so much greater than her. Connecting her to the memory of her ancestors who walked the earth before her and walk with her still. When she speaks, she speaks with the power of the women who have gone before her.

In my own experience, becoming a grandmother has been one of the greatest joys in my life. Continuing the traditions and history of my family that my own Grandmother had shared with me, has made me feel a deeper connection to my line of female ancestors. I will continue to impart wisdom, knowledge, and a love for the past while embracing the future until I take my place among the Disir and my daughters take over my Grandmother role.



I recently added a grandmother chant to my morning ritual to help me connect on a deeper daily basis to that ancestral wisdom. Here is an example of the ritual.

After waking up, stretch and take a deep breath. As you light the candles on the altar, express thanks for waking up to another day of limitless possibilities. Quiet yourself in front of your altar. Place your hand over your heart and tap out the rhythm on your chest while remembering that your own heartbeat is just one in a long line of your ancestors that stand with you. As you do this concentrate on your female ancestors and say,

"Grandmothers lend me your hands. Keep my ears sharp to hear your voices. Fill me with your wisdom. Guide me in teaching the next generation. Bringing the Folk Home."

I repeat that a few times. Usually, three or five. Depending on what I know of the day ahead, I ask for guidance. At that point, I stop tapping and listen with not only my head but my heart as well. I thank and hail them. Then I'll pull a rune and set it on the altar and concentrate on it. I say the name of the rune out loud and repeat it over and over. Thinking about what I know about the rune, what it could mean to me at that moment. I take a deep breath and blow out the candles.

I am working on creating a deeper understanding of ancestral wisdom and passing that knowledge on to future generations. This is the role of Amma to me.
