Words From Our Gothar

Ancient Europeans before the Viking Age



Our ancient traditions are many times older than the Viking Age. There is certainly a cultural continuity back to at least the Bronze Age, and most likely to our huntergatherers of the Eurasian Steppe or the "Great Steppe", a vast eco-region of temperate grasslands and shrubs. Our far-fairing people came from the Taiga, or boreal forests, which is an area characterized by coniferous trees. It spans from Karelia to the Pacific, from Alaska to Labrador Canada and from parts of the northern U.S. to Estonia, Sweden, Norway, and to the Scottish Highlands.

Our Folk built the first large structures, longhouses, 7,000 years ago, and Kurgan, or better known as burial mounds, found also in western Europe.

Our Folk have a culture that predates the Middle East. Our stories are not recorded with hieroglyphs or cuneiform writing but are found now through the sciences of DNA and archeology.

Our culture/religion is ancient. We have been challenged before. Be it climate upheavals, tyrants, or fools, we are resilient! Let us be like the pine tree of the Taiga, strong, be of rough bark.

Fate



When we talk about Wyrd, or fate, often ideas of karma, or maybe an old Vikings movie or even a Greek mythology movie might be conjured up. But how many of us

really understand this concept? Fate is an interesting conundrum. For Americans, we are taught from a young age things like manifest destiny, and it was our fate to conquer from coast to coast, to be world leader, etc. yet we are also taught the ever popular "no fate but what we make." So, what is it? Are we driven inexorably towards a preordained destination? Or do we forge our own path and destination? The answer is complex.

Many people are drawn to think of Wyrd as karma. Perhaps the Aryan concept of karma is easily digestible because it has been so mainstream and popular. But Wyrd is much more complex than pop Hinduism, karma itself is a much deeper concept than mainstream popular culture would have you believe. But let's dive into Wyrd. Wyrd as we know is a web of cause and effect. Fate drives us, not because an outcome was decided at birth and no matter what, that is the destination. Fate is, what must be, what should be, and what could be. All of our decisions paint the picture that is our lives, all lead to a direction. We can change that direction, by good decisions and bad ones. Some may be tempted to excuse bad behavior, bad action, by "well, that's fate baby. I don't have a choice in it." This is pure folly. Fate lights a path for us to lead to the correct destination, it is up to us to see the light and take the path. We can struggle and fight and go down a different path. That is free will. But ultimately, recognizing the Tru lit path, will make our lives more full, more rich, and more authentic to our purpose.

Many struggles and seemingly devastating occurrences in my own life, that felt terrible at the time, have led me down the correct path. Every heartache, every struggle, has led me to where I am today.

What does this mean in practical application? Well, the struggles we face, the hardship, the heartache, the pain, we lament at the time, but often steer us in the direction we are meant to go. So, when you struggle, when something happens that seems devastating, try to remember this is happening for a reason, trust in fate. Following the path that fate has lit up for me has caused temporary struggle but has always steered me in a direction that ultimately was much better and made me happier.

Trust in fate, the Nornir know what they are doing. Follow that lit path and love every minute in Miðgarð.

Eyvind Kinnrifi | February 9th



Near to what could be considered the beginning of the Christian conversion of Norway, under King Olaf Tryggvason, there was a farmer of Noble stock who stood against the

king and his attempts at conversion.

Eyvind (Pronounced Ivin) Kinnrifi was called to make plans against the upcoming invasion by his friend Harek of Thjotta, who had very recently returned home after himself refusing conversion to Christianity. Eyvind answered the call, and for the sake of haste, he traveled with only a small retinue of men. He was well welcomed by Harek, but shortly after his arrival Eyvind was ambushed.

Unbeknownst to Harek, he had been followed by some of Olaf Tryggvason's men. They forced Eyvind to Throndhjem, where Olaf attempted to convert Evyind, first with offers of land and gold, and then with threats of torture and death. Unwilling to turn him back on his faith, Eyvind was eventually killed.

So, what can we learn from this story?

On the 9th of February, as we stop to remember Eyvind Kinrifi and his unwavering faith despite the consequences, take a moment to consider what in your own life is important to you. Have there ever been times in which you had to choose between keeping your faith and losing something else? A Job? A friend? Family?

Even in these times, when we are living with unparalleled freedom of choice, it can be difficult to choose faith over all else. It is sometimes easier to hide behind the idea of a pseudonym or to keep your faith hidden from those in our lives that should matter. Remember, when you think of Eyvind, what truly matters. Stand strong with and take pride in your Folk.

Charming of the Plow | February 17th



Charming of the Plow is a ritual that takes place at the early beginning of the planting season. As the name implies the plow, or other tools used, are blessed and offerings are made to the Gods for a productive growing season. Traditionally, after blessing the plow, a ceremonial furrow was dug and then filled with cakes and other offerings. For our ancestors, this was a crucial time of year. Poor preparation often led to a poor harvest and a poor harvest led to starvation.

Asatru is the modern celebration of our ancestral heritage. Charming of the Plow symbolizes our willful penetration of the unyielding soil. It is with our own industriousness, our own will, that we create, that we change, that we provide. In the Asatru Folk Assembly, we often celebrate the Charming of the Plow by planting a tree.

Inflict your will on your world. As Asatruar, this is a time to "charm" the implements of your own productivity. Entreating the divine to bless your tools and your plans for the year is essential to starting things off right. Inviting the divine into our plans and intentions is a great way of making us aware of the sacrality that should be a part of all you do. The AFA encourages all Asatruar to be industrious in all that we do. Dream grand dreams. Make solid plans. DO big things. And after hard work, reap a bountiful harvest.

And what can you do to celebrate Charming of the Plow? Though most of us do not rely on growing our own food to survive, now is a good time to consider starting a small garden, or even just growing some herbs on the patio. Make a plan. Choose a small patch of yard and map out your garden beds. Bless the shovels and spades. Dig up the soil and begin fertilizing it with eggshells and coffee grinds. Prepare. If you

cannot plant a small garden begin planning some project. Sew a quilt, built a chair, take an idea and make a plan, and then put that plan into action.



Gothar Spotlight

Svan Herul, Witan, Virginia



Ordained March 14, 2020 Mentored by Alsherjargothi Matthew Flavel

Svan is a native-born Icelander whose family immigrated to the US when he was 5 years old. Svan found his way to his ancestral faith in 1994 when he was a young teenager.

He joined the Asatru Folk Assembly in 2016. During that time, he founded Irongard Kindred, and began apprentice Folkbuilding. He brought with him a pious spirit, his knowledge of the Runes, and of our Sacred Lore that he continues to share with our priesthood and our Folk.

In 2019 and 2020 Svan was absolutely critical to the founding of Þórshof in North Carolina. I was present for much of the process. I can remember being there when he took his Gothar Ordination at Ostara in the South 2020. So impressed with his presentation and his overall presence, I decided to put my name in the hat for the Gothar Program.



Beginning in 2020, Svan began the pious task of painting murals for each of our Hofs, starting with Porr in NC, for which I personally was present. He would go on to reverently put together all of our Hof murals.



Later in 2021 at Midsummer, Gothi Herul was appointed to the AFA Witan, a counsel of Gothar that advise the Alsherjargothi and disseminate his policies to the Gothar and Folkbuilders.



I was accepted to the Gothar Program the year Svan was ordained, alongside Trent East, Rob Stamm, Brandy Callahan, Clifford Erickson and others. Myself, Trent, and Rob fell under Svan's influence and his tutelage for much of the journey to being ordained. All of us have been influenced to a degree by Svan and his wisdom, but the 3 of us, myself, Trent, and Rob were directly impacted by him.

Much of the success we have experienced at Þórshof is directly the result of his hard work, and the dedication of Svan and his family. We each owe him a debt of gratitude for that hard work and piety.

In May of 2022, my wife Heather and I renewed our vows to commemorate our 25th wedding anniversary, and we could think of no one we'd rather preside than Witan Herul.



If I could build a Gothi, Svan would be the model for what that Gothi would be. Witan Svan is a close friend. He's one of the most influential and respected of our Gothar. I'm glad he's my friend, my mentor and my priest.



The importance of this AFA Prison Ministry is so much more than just for those who are actually incarcerated, it benefits not only them as followers of Asatru but their families and loved ones on the outside as they will see the noticeable change in their demeanor and demand that our faith commands for them to lead a noble life. We all are future ancestors and will help them be examples of our faith and not be a burden or a product of recidivism.

We are compiling letters from prisoners that are Educational, Empowering, and Encouraging along with special spiritual writings from our Gothar to create a quarterly newsletter to be distributed to inmates, institutions, and jails. Our mission is not about providing free books or literature to bored prisoners who simply want free stuff. We intend on making real-world change for the better of our folk.

""No packed rooms in the prisons; in each institution I have only a few people; occasionally about a dozen, but 5-6 is more common. I certainly do not want the Fellowship to be a club for cons, or ex-cons; the advantage is that when in prison the inmates have time to discuss and digest what they read, a point that often is lost to people on the outside in the hubbub of daily concerns" - Else Christensen

By the example of our Folkmother, Else Christensen, we will also be going into prisons as we are able to. Some of our Gothar and other leadership, will be going into the prisons to hold study groups, lead blot, and encourage continued growth in the folk inside.

Cooking for our Folk



Cooking from the Heart. One of the first chefs I worked for told me that there are two main rules to cooking.

- 1. ALWAYS cook from the heart!
- 2. You must know the why of the rule before you can think about breaking it.

To this day, I still believe that number one is the most important; but two is the most valuable lesson. So, for example: why would you add flour to the mix when are you making Fried Potato balls? It doesn't add anything to the dish overall and in fact, it takes away flavor and disrupts texture. The reason is that what flour takes away: is moisture. It adds to the binder and liquid consumption.

So, what does this mean for the folk? Plan and simply don't take shortcuts. Whenever I pick up the knife and began cooking for the folk, I think of it as channeling the ancestors. Cooking reminds me of that age-old musing "I don't measure seasoning; I wait for the tap on the shoulder from the ancestors to tell me that's enough."

When you cook from the heart, people can tell. Don't cook out of spite or obligation. Cook for the folk because you want to! Find new recipes. Test them. Make them better. And when your heart tells you it is right...time to serve. If you have never made cookies from scratch...make them. Why not? Use the best ingredients you can afford (don't take out a second mortgage for this) but be proud to feed the folk.

Catalina dressing




Kara, age 11, and Russell, age 3, solved January's maze and practiced a little cursive!






It was a fantastic event, surrounded by such wonderful members. May all the Folk have a blessed and honorable new year!

Courage Is Better Than Cowardice



Thor contemplating what it means to have courage.

For the remainder of this winter, I want to focus on one of the Nine Noble Virtues, which is most often listed as the first of the virtues: Courage. Without the ability to be brave, stagnation sets in, and we tend to freeze in place and cut ourselves off from doing anything new, often because of the fear of failure, of conflict, etc.

Courage does not mean the absence of fear. Fear is a normal part of our everyday experience. Someone who feels fear isn't a coward; rather, the man or woman who cowers in a corner and gives in to inaction rather than meeting fear head on would be considered a coward. In the ancient world, a coward was considered one of the worst things for someone to be, and someone who acquired a reputation as a coward would universally be met with scorn.

Hávamál stanza 15 reminds us of the importance of bravery and also the nobility of a brave man:

15. The son of a king | shall be silent and wise, And bold in battle as well: Bravely and gladly | a man shall go, Till the day of his death is come.

Many of our heroes in the AFA are the men and women who had the courage to brave the potential consequences and declare their allegiance to our Gods and our Folk even when threatened with death. For example, Raud the Strong, a masterful seaman and chieftain of central Norway during the reign of Olaf Tryggvason, was tortured to death in the 990s by King Olaf because he would not abandon his faith. The AFA hero for February, Eyvind Kinnrifi, was a valiant chieftain of northern Norway who was similarly captured by Olaf and tortured in an attempt to make him renounce Asatru and embrace a foreign religion. Ultimately, as a brazier of hot coals was being prepared to be lowered on Eyvind, which would bring about his certain death in agonizing fashion, Eyvind still refused to submit and renounce the Gods of his Folk. Luckily, we don't have to face certain death simply for going out and practicing our faith, so in honor of the sacrifices of those who came before us, we should come together and give thanks to our Gods!

As the Hávamál passage reminds us, bravery and the joy of living go hand in hand. There is something both serene and bold in the act of striding forward, despite your fear, and smiling at whatever life throws at you. This can apply to us in many things, such as a career change that would make us more money but would require either a temporary or a permanent move, or it can be something as simple as the courage to walk out of the front door and go to an AFA event or moot as a new member who hasn't personally met anyone (and it's especially easy to talk ourselves out of doing this if it involves a long drive!). We've all been that person at one time or another.

Getting involved in the AFA was one of the best and most fulfilling experiences I've ever had. If you're reading this and are considering joining the AFA, or, if you've joined but haven't made it to anything yet, I highly recommend coming out to a moot or event, especially at one of our AFA Hofs. Have the courage to take that step forward! You won't regret it. And, as someone who lives about 15 hours away from the closest Hof (and that's without stopping, which is impossible), I understand the struggle of travel. While this is a challenge, it just makes it that much more fulfilling once you finally do show up at the front door! I hope to see you all very soon.

Spring Comes Early to Those Who Will It



February is a hopeful time. While it is still cold, we begin to dream of and plan for Spring. For most of us, the time to start a spring garden is still a ways off, regardless of what Punxsutawney Phil decides. Today, I wanted to share a little activity that anyone can do to have beautiful blooms throughout the winter months.

- Step 1: Find a glass jar or other container.
- Step 2: Fill 1/3 of the glass with small rocks.
- Step 3: Place a bulb on top of the rocks.
- Step 4: Add water until it just barely reaches the bulb (not soaking it).
- Step 5: Mark the date and your name in Sharpie somewhere on the glass (see who's bulb blooms first!)
- Step 6: Set jars in a window that get some sun during the day.
- Step 7: Add in a little more water when needed as the water evaporates.
- Step 8: Now you wait approximately 2 weeks for beautiful spring flowers. That's it!



In my home, we started 5 bulbs on January 9th using this method. By our will and our tender care sprinkled with apricity, we had spring blooms midwinter! Each family member used a different sized glass jar. My one-year-old daughter's jar was the smallest, and my older kids were amazed when her bulb bloomed first. It was fun making predictions and observing the daily changes. With glass jars, we could clearly see the growth of the roots up close! We used white narcissus and yellow daffodil bulbs, and the white narcissus definitely triumphed over the daffodils.



Have a beautiful February, Folk! No matter the weather, go ahead and plant some bulbs and begin to shift to a spring state of mind. Will something beautiful into existence.

Bridgeport Covered Bridge Moot




consistently.

Through it all, we cleaned up outbuildings, planned Folkvangr's next endeavors, read books, taught my daughter the runes, and engaged in one of the best Tabletop Campaigns we've done in a long time hosted by Northern Bastion Kindred out of Coeur D'Alene, Idaho.

The campaign was every Saturday night, and we all would hop on a call together transcending the issue of geographical isolation (much like our Unity Calls that take place at 6pm PST every Sunday). Set in the grim dark world of Warhammer 40000, our heroes engaged in heroic deeds against Alien horrors. As the DM, I had the interesting job of running what is known as a meat grinder campaign. To reject older means and methods for the sake of ease, comfort, and the worship of new technology is to reject our ancestors as simpletons who knew very little. The most prevalent sources of illness and sorrow do not come from ancient sources but the man-made horrors of today. Many of the older traditions prevent these

illnesses and ward us against the soul sickness we see ravaging its way through our people.



I encourage you all to be conscious of your decisions and the reasons behind them. There is nothing wrong with using inventions, tools and technology that make your life better so long as you do so with the knowledge of your alternatives. There is nothing wrong with using new methodologies of today so long as you are not chasing so-called progress for the sake of progress. I do not call on you to reject all comfort and convenience, becoming luddites, but I do call on you to take personal responsibility for

your family's well-being. Embrace self-sufficiency, and you will not let yourself down when storms roll in, whatever their form.





Water Fowl Hunting Tips



My haul from my first duck hunt.

Howdy Folks!

I've been somewhat successful hunting duck and goose this season here in Washington, and I wanted to share some of my knowledge with those of you who would like to get into hunting.

I'll start with how to identify geese, brants, and swans, and how to tell if they've been in a particular spot recently. I'm assuming that you've never hunted before, and I'll cover the most basic things in addition to the more obscure tips and observations I have to share.

The types of geese and relative species in the US include: Canada Goose, Snow Goose, Swan Goose, Emperor Goose, Cackling Goose or "Cacklers," Bar-headed Goose, and the Greater White Fronted Goose (more commonly known as Speckled Geese or "Specks"), Trumpeter Swan, Tundra Swan, and Mute Swan. There are also the Atlantic Brants (separated into light-bellied and dark-bellied) and Black Brants. There are other subspecies, but these are the more common and root-species for all the others in Northern America.

Swans are essentially large and exclusively white feathered geese. Brants or Brents are small, mostly dark-feathered geese that are almost as small as the largest ducks.





All of the species I listed before are migratory birds meaning they travel on North-South paths during the winter and the inverse in the spring. The most common species are Trumpeter Swans, Snow Geese and Canada Geese. The most common type of Brant depends on what side of the country you're on. Black Brants are more exclusive to the western half of the continent, while the Atlantic Brant is obviously the most common in the east, with the light-bellied Brant being more common than the dark-bellied.

However, one thing that separates these species from ducks and songbirds, is that there is little size and very little pattern and color difference between the male and female birds. The two sexes are very close in size, with males being a tad larger and having identical colorations and patterns to one another. Most ducks and many songbirds have completely different colorations and are noticeably different in size but will share distinguishing features. Most ducks will share portions of their patterns on their heads, tails, and wings. One thing that is very constant between all migratory birds, though there are a few exceptions, is that both male and female will have the same style of feet and beaks. Although color can differ, it is sometimes the same.

Goose footprints are webbed with three toes and in soft dirt, sand, or mud, and there will be a rear toe print. They often look like curved tridents, as the webbing doesn't always leave a mark, often only a thin line between the toes. Most geese have black or orange feet.

The easiest type of birds to mix up would be Snow Geese and swans. Snow Geese have orange beaks and feet with black tips to their wings. Swans, much like most of their cousins, will have black feet and either yellow-orange or black bills. Other than behavior, the two easiest ways to distinguish between the two is the pure white pattern of swans and the difference in calls and behavior. I will address the calls and behaviors later on when I go over how to hunt and attract swans, geese, and brants.

Goose feces are very easy to identify, they look like rat poison pellets. They are green and tubular, from ¼ inch to ½ inch in diameter and like other bird droppings they start to turn white after a couple days.

That's the basics of identifying different types of geese and the signs of their presence. I'll talk next week about where to find them and their common behaviors.

I know that for most states, waterfowl season closes soon or already has, but I hope this will help those of you with a spring season and the rest of you next year.
