We made our circle in such a way that to incorporate my mom's grave in the circle with us and I was able to stand in Blot by her side. I can't do it justice and I can't share the feeling, but I do want to share that it was extremely special for me, and my soul is better for it.

Lots of us had "the magic" happen at Winter Nights this year.



Ingwaz? Such a small and simple rune. And yet, I came home with a sense of fulfillment and energy I haven't experienced in a long while.





We Remember You



Alan Wittenberg was a long-time member of the Asatru Folk Assembly and a good friend. He was born in Missoula, Montana on July 2nd in the year 1949.

His father was a stone mason and scholar, preserving a tradition of his family that went back to Scandinavia. His mother lovingly cared for the hearth and raised him to be a kind and caring man.







For a time, Alan worked with his father and his Uncle Stanley Hendrickson, learning the family trade. His work, and that of his family's, can be seen throughout Missoula.

Alan was part of two rock bands during his life. He played with Intripid and the Klassics.

He was a green thumb, and had a very healthy garden where he grew vegetables and flowers alike.

But Alan's true calling was the family occupation of scholar. Alan was witty and a brilliant writer. His sense of humor and the joy he found in this world filled volumes of his work as he studied the mysteries of the Runes.





Alan can be best described as a seeker. His thirst for knowledge set him on the Odinic path decades ago and his work primarily focused on runic knowledge and mysteries.

His work is being cataloged and preserved by the Odinic Order of the Ulfhednar, of which he was involved with as the Hall's Patron Hero. Now in his passing, the Hall remembers him and honors him by preserving his legacy.



More important than his involvement with the Hall, he was a long time AFA member and once told me that his favorite part of the month was getting *The Runestone*. Alan was far too remote to be able to make it to the hofs but his constant support dated back to the Asatru Free Assembly days. In later years, thanks to technological improvements, he became much more involved. I will never forget that we held his first group Blot together or the joy he professed during his first Sumbel.

Alan received last rites in the form of the final Wayfarer's Blot surrounded by his loving family and afa members. Alan was perfectly lucid for the blot where he was honored by those who loved him and where he was presented with beautiful grave goods.

Alan passed with a smile on his face listening to Hemkomst ready to meet his ancestors.

Greetings Parents and Students!






Hard to believe that we are nearing Yule, and halfway through our school year. We are all very proud of you and the entire Assembly cheers you on!



Queen Sigrið of Sweden | November 9



Though little information of Sigrid, Queen of Sweden, exists in a historical text, the stories abound. Born a Swedish noblewoman Sigrid married Erik the Victorious and together they had one son. She became the Regent after the king's death, and it wasn't long before her vast wealth drew out all of the suitors, one of whom was her own foster brother.

Tired of the constant suitors, and very aware of poor manners, it is said that Sigrid invited her foster brother and another suitor to a feast only to light the building on fire and lock them inside. This didn't scare away the Christian Tyrant, Olaf Tryggvason. She might have entertained his proposal, but when he demanded that she convert to Christianity to wed him, Sigrid immediately turned him away. This enraged Tryggvason so much that he first insulted her age and beauty, and then slapped her. The story says she then told him that his behavior very well might lead to his death.

It was not long before Sigrid united Sweden with Denmark by marrying King Sweyn Forkbeard. Already feuding with Olaf, it didn't take much for Sigrid to convince her new husband to go to war. This led to one of the largest ancient maritime battles, the Battle of Swold, in which Olaf Tryggvason was killed.

What can we learn from this story?

While we can't run around burning to death the people that annoy us, we can take a stand for ourselves and our Folk. We have the right to defend ourselves and our dignity from those who would try to dimmish us. And when we all work together as a cohesive group so much can be done to defend and raise our Folk up.



Holiday

Feast of the Einherjar | November 11 (Observed November 18)



One of the most recognizable motifs in Asatru is that of the Viking warrior. Helm, sword, beard, and blood: boys and girls have long been mesmerized by the stories of Valkyries and the eternal feasting and fighting of the Einherjar in Odin's Hall, Valhalla. Pop culture has taken the Berserker and the Valkyrie and remade them hundreds of times.

Our ancestors lived in a different time, when fighting wars and general "viking" was necessary for survival. For a warrior, to die in battle was the greatest honor. Today, war is not necessary in the same way. Most people scoff at war, urge their children to "do better" or "be better". For those of us who practice Asatru, however, we recognize the importance and the value of the warrior. More important still, is the importance and the value of those who have fallen, the Einherjar.

Once a year we set aside a day specifically to honor the Einherjar. We raise a horn to the fallen warriors to thank them for fighting for our people and our freedom. One way to celebrate is to set a place at the table for the Einherjar. Serve them the same food you are eating for dinner. Pour them a glass of wine or beer. When you are done, leave the plate outside under a special tree in offering. Another way to celebrate would be to visit the graves of veterans at a local cemetery and help to clean them up. Leave some decorations or a small flag.

You don't have to have any veterans in your immediate family. It is a guarantee that somewhere down your ancestral lines you have family who fought in war, and most as

likely, that some of them didn't return from the front lines. It is in your blood. So, raise that horn, and raise it high. Remember our fallen.




The hike to the top of the location of the future Hof is beautiful. While it does take effort, the experience itself as a lead up to a sacred ritual prepares you in a very powerful way.

The mountains literally echo with the devotion of our Folk in ritual!







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Cooking for our Folk



Cooking from the Heart. One of the first chefs I worked for told me that there are two main rules to cooking.

- ALWAYS cook from the heart!
- 2. You must know the why of the rule before you can think about breaking it.

To this day, I still believe that number one is the most important; but two is the most valuable lesson. So, for example: why would you add flour to the mix when are you making Fried Potato balls? It doesn't add anything to the dish overall and in fact, it takes away flavor and disrupts texture. The reason is that what flour takes away: is moisture. It adds to the binder and liquid consumption.

So, what does this mean for the folk? Plan and simply don't take shortcuts. Whenever I

pick up the knife and began cooking for the folk, I think of it as channeling the ancestors. Cooking reminds me of that age-old musing "I don't measure seasoning; I wait for the tap on the shoulder from the ancestors to tell me that's enough."

When you cook from the heart, people can tell. Don't cook out of spite or obligation. Cook for the folk because you want to! Find new recipes. Test them. Make them better. And when your heart tells you it is right...time to serve. If you have never made cookies from scratch...make them. Why not? Use the best ingredients you can afford (don't take out a second mortgage for this) but be proud to feed the folk.

AFA Prison Ministry



The importance of this AFA Prison Ministry is so much more than just for those who are actually incarcerated, it benefits not only them as followers of Asatru but their families and loved ones on the outside as they will see the noticeable change in their demeanor and demand that our faith commands for them to lead a noble life. We all are future ancestors and will help them be examples of our faith and not be a burden or a product of recidivism.

We are compiling letters from prisoners that are Educational, Empowering, and Encouraging along with special spiritual writings from our Gothar to create a quarterly newsletter to be distributed to inmates, institutions, and jails. Our mission is not about providing free books or literature to bored prisoners who simply want free stuff. We intend on making real-world change for the better of our folk.

""No packed rooms in the prisons; in each institution I have only a few people; occasionally about a dozen, but 5-6 is more common. I certainly do not want the Fellowship to be a club for cons, or ex-cons; the advantage is that when in prison the inmates have time to discuss and digest what they read, a point that often is lost to people on the outside in the hubbub of daily concerns" - Else Christensen

By the example of our Folkmother, Else Christensen, we will also be going into prisons as we are able to. Some of our Gothar and other leadership, will be going into the prisons to hold study groups, lead blot, and encourage continued growth in the folk inside.

Ancestral Food and Culture

Apfelkucken Recipe



An Autumn treat enjoyed with coffee breakfast, after supper for dessert, or even for a nice snack. Perfect for the leftover apple pickings. Enjoy this classic traditional German dish with your family and friends.

Apfelkucken 8 Granny Smith apples

- 4 thinly sliced
- 4 chopped
- 2 c granulated sugar
- 5 tbl granulated sugar
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 3 c all purpose flour
- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt
- 1 1/2 baking soda
- 1 1/2 baking powder
- 6 eggs
- 1 c applesauce
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/3 c orange juice

Glaze:

- 1 1/2 c powdered sugar
- 2 tbl butter
- 1 tbl water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter to round cake pans, dust with flour, tap out excess flour.

Peel, core, and slice apples then place in bowl. Mix sugar and cinnamon toss evenly.

In a large mixing bowl combine flour, 2 c sugar, salt, baking soda and powder. Add eggs, applesauce, vanilla extract, and orange juice.


Fill bottom of each pan with batter, then layer with apple slices and chopped apples, and add remaining batter on top.

Bake for 1 hour, prick with toothpick to ensure its fully baked.

Mix glaze ingredients until smooth. Drizzle over cakes. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream on top or coffee.

We then gathered inside the Hall, where Elder McNallen recited his poem "October Women". After a few general AFA updates, the men went outside and contemplated their goals. They wrote down their blessings, the things they need to focus on, and the steps they will take to achieve two of them.



Inside, the women had their ladies' chat and "tea time", where they painted small treasure boxes and completed the same blessings exercise as the men.



Children spent the afternoon engaged in various games including Mummy Wrap, Archery, Chess, and Monopoly. They also did some pumpkin painting and made adorable mummy lanterns with googly eyes.



After a delicious dinner, we headed outside for Blot. Gythia McNallen put on a beautiful Disirblót that was bound to touch many, myself included, when I felt my grandmother embrace me in a hug and fill me with warmth. My daughter began kicking

up a storm as I felt the embrace overtake me. It was impossible to hold back tears. Blot ended and everyone pulled a rune as a message from their ancestors.



The rest of the night was spent exchanging stories about loved ones who've passed beyond the veil, discussing the meaning behind their runes, and considering what message their mother may have for them from this rune and Sumbel.

Everyone turned in for the night and got ready for the Movie Matinée on Sunday!




Upcoming Events

Service Before Self



In August of 2010, I was shipped off to San Antonio, Texas to begin what would be my military career. I enlisted in the United States Air Force, and though I scored a 77 on my ASVAB, I had unlimited opportunities. I chose to become a member of Security Forces. I had friends who did the job, and they even warned me not to do it, but my mind was set as a young 21-year-old, who thought they knew everything. Only a few people in my family supported my decision-- my grandfather on my mother's side, and reluctantly, my own father. I had wasted a year of college doing things I did not enjoy, and, after a lot of thought, I decided it was my time to do something for my country. I

actually was seeing a guy at the time (for the past 3 years), and he told me that if I enlisted, he would leave me. Cutting that fat was easy.



Basic Training was an 8 tough weeks of transformation. It changed a lot of perspectives for me, and for a time, I felt as though the word "female" was a slur with the way the male Military Training Instructors spoke it. My family came to see me at my graduation, and I could not have been more proud of myself. I spent the next 13 weeks, still at Lackland, but now doing Technical Training. I was learning everything beneath the umbrella of Security Forces, from law enforcement, domestics, traffic stops, vehicle inspections, and signs of duress. The day that orders for our first duty station were given, I was shocked to find that I had landed Misawa AB, Japan. Now 22 years old, I was a world traveler.

Everything about Japan was so different from America, from the way the people treat one another, their environment, and anything else they hold sacred. I visited onsens, mom and pop's ramen shops, karaoke bars, and so much more. Being the smallest in my squad, they decided I needed to carry the largest gun, the M249 machine gun. Luckily, a few months later, the Air Force instructions would change and the weapon would be removed from normal posting regulations.

The most notable thing to happen within my military career was the 9.0 earthquake that happened in Japan! It was insane to watch the sidewalks rolling like waves of the

ocean, and the buildings on rollers swayed so much that one might think they would collide into each other. But that was not the case. We went without power for 5 days in "non-essential" buildings and consumed MREs for 5 days. Civilians were sent home on Uncle Sam's dollar, and military units from other nations came to help with the relief. It was amazing to see all the different uniforms, hear the different languages, and see how they all came to Japan's aid. I did my part in helping a local farm get their land cleaned up. Unfortunately, they were swine farmers and they lost their whole stock.



After two years in Japan, I was sent to McConnell AFB in Wichita, Kansas. Although McConnell was not a fighter jet base as Misawa was, they had the freight planes. Misawa had the F-15s and McConnell had the C-17s. Working the flightline was probably the worst and best part of the job. Working gates was the worst, and I really hated traffic violations. In 2014, I ended my military career with an Honorable Discharge. In June of 2021, I began my education really cracking down and utilizing my Post 9/11 GI Bill. In October of next year, I will graduate with my Bachelor's Degree in Cybersecurity.

I learned a lot, changed a lot, and grew under my enlistment, and that will always be apart of who I am - from now until forever.


All of this work has been volunteer; done in spare time from other duties and jobs. Thank you for all of the sweat and dedication!




