

Devotion Works



I don't remember having a singular moment of revelation where I suddenly knew the Gods were real.

I was initially skeptical of Ásatrú because I didn't believe in the supernatural and my faith was science or secular humanism. Time did its thing and I found myself wanting more than that selfish worldview could ever provide. I wanted a community with deeper roots.

So, I went back to the Catholic Church of my upbringing. I had a true crisis of faith, rebelled against Yahweh and had held an anger at "God" for years. But in the decade that I had been away from it, that church had dramatically failed. The old folks wouldn't touch each other during the sign of peace because they were afraid of swine flu or avian flu- whichever fad flu it was. There were no young people. The Irish parish was full of Asians...

I was also becoming racially aware at this time. I was growing frustrated with the erosion of traditional roles and status that I had been raised to expect and of the broader cultures' rejection of natural order. I became interested in political movements, but ultimately was underwhelmed by the quality of the people involved compared with the ideals.

Along the way, I was introduced to "Norse paganism" and binged around various groups. Some were universalist (even though in practice it was all white people), some were "tribal" whereby the importance was on being adopted into the tribe, and some were Folkish with a focus on the kinship between the Aesir and the Folk.

One of those Folkish groups was the Asatru Folk Assembly which was relatively small in Pennsylvania at the time. I was very much a tire kicker. I hung around but didn't join any. Our local AFA Folkbuilder at the time, Pat Hall, managed to arrange for the McNallens and senior leadership (which included Alaska Folkbuilder Matt Flavel) to come to an event called Winter Nights in the Poconos. This was the first time I was able to participate in Blot and Sumbel with Folk who truly believed in our Gods, rather than using them for various political and social reasons. I still wasn't there. But I did make up my mind to choose to "believe in believing in the Gods". I still didn't join the AFA for almost another year. I began a practice of devotion to the Gods, with much guidance from Folkbuilder Hall. I learned about the runes and ways to use them. I read the Elder and Younger Eddas, various retellings of the Eddic stories that were easier to understand, and the Völsung Saga. I didn't read much contemporary material, which I think benefited me. Steven McNallen hadn't published "Ásatrú" yet.

I began meditating and I began a gift cycle first with my ancestors- after all, even as a skeptical person I knew for a fact that my ancestors were real once. I started to become more confident in myself in ways not related to religion or politics. I then chose to assume that this was my ancestors blessing me, and if this were true that I would also assume that other spirits were real such as Vættir and the Æsir.

I joined the AFA, and by the time I had done this I had enough real proof in my life that devotion my ancestors, that honor to the wights and that worship if the Gods made a real and positive difference in my life that they must be real.

I decided to become a Folkbuilder. I met my wife in the AFA. All my closest non-blood friends I know because of the AFA. My children were born into the AFA. I have the great privilege to serve our Folk in a way so much more important than politics. I share in the chance to really change the course of our history for the better in a permanent way.

It's now over 25 years since I had a crisis of faith with Roman Catholicism. I was a snobby, know-it-all atheist for ten of those years. I thought the universe was there for me to observe. I'd have loved simulation theory if it were more mature at the time.

It's been 15 years since I was first aware of Ásatrú as a modern religion, and 10 years since I made a gamble of a choice to treat it as real even if I was intellectually resistant to such things.

And that has made all the difference in my life. I know some people have a moment of revelation. But for those who have not, you should know that it is okay and quite

normal. Devotion will yield a slow "drip, drip, drip" of blessings that make you stronger and more confident. It will win your fame. It will win you the girl. It will build your wealth. Things will happen when and in such a way so as to make it undeniable that your devotion is working. That energy builds up in a way I have trouble describing.


That will be all the proof that you need.

Odin, Vili, Vé: A Closer Look



Odin, Vili, & Vé are typically viewed as the first of the Æsir. They took action to create our world as we know it, ordered in a way that our Folk were able to thrive. They each gave us a gift to make us who we are, setting in motion the countless victories and immeasurable glory that our ancestors attained. Our mind, our body, and our spirit are all owed to these first three among the Æsir.

The gifts of mind, body, and spirit are not all we were given at the dawn of our world. These tangible boons are priceless, of course, but we've also been given something more abstract: a roadmap to success in any endeavor.



As with many things, including the deeper lessons in our faith, language and etymology is one of our best tools. Let's take a look at some meanings found in the names of these Gods.

Odin means "inspiration", roughly. "Vili" means "will". Vé means "sacred".

Before we go further, I want to make clear that I am not suggesting that the Gods are mere archetypes or symbols. The Gods are real, and powerful, and beyond worthy of our devotion.

That being said, the recipe for success is found in this tale.



The "sacred" found in the name Vé can fairly be interpreted as piety and devotion.

The "will" found in the name Vili can be viewed as conscious intent.

And, of course, the "inspiration" found in the All-Father's name is that relentless drive and ambition that has always made our people stand out in the annals of history!

Piety. Intent. Furious ambition.

These are the three tools needed for Victory in any serious endeavor, and these are the very same tools that the AFA carries on our march to glory in the name of the Gods.

Pagan vs Neo-Pagan; A Response



Lately or the latest shrill accusations from the armchair historians, that really only expound their bias about the past of northern Europe, especially about the Christian Conversion a millennium past, has made me want to add my research.

I want to add that my gr.grandfather Gulbrand Torgrimsen-Odden was a healer, a Bloodstopper to be exact. b.1844 Valdres, Norway, emigrated 1865 d,1923 Minnesota.

I counsel you Loddfafner; if you take my advice learn it, you'll profit if you remember it:

Get a good man to teach you the runes, and learn a healing spell while you live.

Wyrd



Wyrd is the etymological equivalent in Old English of Old Norse Urth. The only modern definition of Wyrd is that it roughly translates to "fate". That is not entirely accurate as Wyrd is centered around the significant deed, where one of the fundamental perceptions we have of Wyrd is the tendency of acts to ripple out in all directions from the point at which they take place, crating consequences far beyond what was intended at the time, perceived, or can be comprehended. Wyrd could be defined as fate if and only if we stopped acting indefinitely after an act or deed. Wyrd is much more than just fate. Wyrd is what we make our lives to be, moment by moment, deeds good and poor, woven together and built on the Orlog we inherited at birth.

Wyrd governs the working out of the past into the present and is nearly synonymous with the Norn Urth (that which is) as the activity of the Norns is also referred to as Wyrd as well. Wyrd is the interaction of the past and present as we look at it here action and reaction-and is the weaving together of the sum total of past and present acts and their consequences. It is necessary to become a strong, self-reliant, and wise person with megin and luck through acting well and building off of right action to create a dominant and prosperous web of Wyrd woven in our lives that inevitably cross an indefinite number of other's paths and have effect on them and their Wyrd. The web we weave by our deeds extends well beyond the comprehension of our existence in the cosmos. Wyrd permeates throughout time and space and is stored in the well of Urth layer by layer becoming Orlog. When I refer to deeds, I am not simply talking about mundane, monotonous daily activities. It is the times that activities acquire a special significance that go beyond our limited perceptions. We must prepare and place our lives in accordance with prescribed codes of conduct received from the past and by doing so, creating positive Wyrd, we protect our reputation and insure good fame for ourselves and those close to us. Our actions will be governed by what we know, therefore the wise man seeks to discover all that he can and attempt to associate himself directly with all he knows to be good and wise. By doing so, he will put himself in the best position to die well. It is then that we will fully understand the nature of Wyrd itself.

Wyrd is a continual presence and influence in the rituals, the artifacts, and everyday activities we find ourselves engaging in. It is how actions are related to actions and how significance is to be discovered in the ordinary sequence of events in our lives. If we are to find evidence of the operation of Wyrd, its sustained power and its past, we will have to examine the literary remains of the Germanic peoples themselves; only they will be able to place events in what will be their proper order and to give them their proper significance.

In the coming year be of positive substance and lay down right action. When choosing a course, ask yourself; does this better my church, and am I building, or am I causing chaos. Think of your words to others and ask yourself how you want to be known, or remembered.




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Day of Remembrance

Raud the Strong | January 9th

So well-known was the hero, Raud the Strong, that his story comes to us from several Icelandic Saga's, the most common of which is the Heimskringla (The Chronicle of the Kings of Norway) by Snorri Sturluson. The story tells of a great seafaring warrior who had Thor and Seiðr on his side.



Around the year 1000, the zealous Norwegian King, Olaf Tryggvason, began an expedition to North Norway to continue his Christianization of the pagan people. Olaf found much success in his efforts, owing largely to his brutal methods of both torturing and killing those who refused, but not all were swayed.

In Godøy, near present-day Bodø, lived the man Raud the Strong. Raud was known to have a strong connection with the Sami people, and to own a remarkable longship that was larger than any that Olaf himself owned. With a gold-plated dragon head, it is what many suppose the popular Viking longship designs are based on.

Upon hearing that Olaf was heading his way Raud gathered as many men as he could and lead a great assault at sea. Despite everything, however, Raud found himself overwhelmed and had to retreat from the battle. Stories say that Raud was able to Seiðr to call on the winds to speed him home safely while also blocking Olaf Tryggvason's chase.

It was all for naught, however.

Though he made it home, Raud was eventually caught by Olaf Tryggvasson. Despite the King's efforts, however, Raud refused to turn his back on his gods despite torture. In the end, he was killed when a live snake was forced down his throat. Many of Raud's men, following his example, were also killed after refusing to convert.

So, what can we learn from this story?

Some might make the argument that it is better to fight and die rather than retreat in "shame." In some cases, this might be true. For every one of us sitting here reading this, however, one of our ancestors made a different choice. The choice to convert saved our lives.

For many of our ancestors, death was the best option. Which of us ever chooses to be killed in a horrible, painful way? Was death the easier option? We have to believe that for some, it was. For Raud the Strong, friend of Thor, it was. To convert was to turn his back on his Heritage, to turn on his Honor, and to turn on his Courage and a warrior and leader.

Our ancestors lived in a very different time. They lived in a world in which men and women could be killed for choosing to remain loyal to their Gods. We are exceptionally lucky that we live in a society that allows us the freedom to worship our Gods.

That very same society that allows us to worship our Gods, however, does not do so without stipulations. That society, so unlike the sort of tribal society our ancestors lived in, would tell us how to worship our Gods. They would tell us who is allowed to worship our Gods. And that society would try to harm us for choosing to do it differently than they tell us we are allowed to do it.

We don't face the same torture and death as Raud the Strong for choosing to worship our Gods our way, but we do face the possibility of ostracization from society. People, even our families, can turn their backs on us for disagreeing with the "rules" they have given us. We are not free from the effects of the multi-cultural paradigm, but we don't have to bow to it.

Like Raud the Strong, we can stand tall and be proud of who and what we are. We are Asatruar. Like Raud the Strong, we can stand against those who would tell us to turn our backs on what we know to be Tru. We can live with Honesty, with Courage, and with Honor.

Holiday

Þorrablót | January 20th



Þorrablót is an Icelandic midwinter festival dedicated to, as the name describes, Þorr, or Thor. Þorrablót is named after the Icelandic month of Þorri from the historic-calendar and ran from mid-January to mid-February. Though Þorrablót is a relatively modern social celebration in Iceland, there is a reference in the Flateyjarbók that states that the Kvens offered a yearly sacrifice to Þorri at mid-winter. Typically, Þorrablót is celebrated by gathering together and eating many of Iceland's traditional foods and by singing, reciting poems, and telling stories.

Some good ways to celebrate Þorrablót include eating traditional Icelandic foods, such as Hákarl (putrefied shark), Blóðmör (blood suet, filled sausage/black pudding), Hrútspungur (ram's scrotum with testicles), Lundabaggi (sheep's fat), or Svið (burnt sheep's head). Don't worry! If these are unavailable, or simply not to your taste, eating goat and goat products such as goat cheese or goat milk are also appropriate options.



The importance of this AFA Prison Ministry is so much more than just for those who are actually incarcerated, it benefits not only them as followers of Asatru but their families and loved ones on the outside as they will see the noticeable change in their demeanor and demand that our faith commands for them to lead a noble life. We all are future ancestors and will help them be examples of our faith and not be a burden or a product of recidivism.

We are compiling letters from prisoners that are Educational, Empowering, and Encouraging along with special spiritual writings from our Gothar to create a quarterly newsletter to be distributed to inmates, institutions, and jails. Our mission is not about providing free books or literature to bored prisoners who simply want free stuff. We intend on making real-world change for the better of our folk.

""No packed rooms in the prisons; in each institution I have only a few people; occasionally about a dozen, but 5-6 is more common. I certainly do not want the Fellowship to be a club for cons, or ex-cons; the advantage is that when in prison the inmates have time to discuss and digest what they read, a point that often is lost to people on the outside in the hubbub of daily concerns" - Else Christensen

By the example of our Folkmother, Else Christensen, we will also be going into prisons as we are able to. Some of our Gothar and other leadership, will be going into the prisons to hold study groups, lead blot, and encourage continued growth in the folk inside.

Book Release January 15th: *The Children from Frostmo Mountain* by Laura Fitinghoff, Translated by AFA Member Laura Lugnet

For just over a year, I have been working to translate "Barnen ifrån Frostmo Fjället," a Swedish literary gem, into English in the hopes of sharing it with a wider audience.

Throughout the process, I have developed such a personal connection to the novel, and I am proud and excited to finally be able to share it.

In the final stages of preparing the book for publication, I noticed that January 15th was the name day for "Laura" here in Sweden. It seemed most fitting for me, then, to release my translation on the name day that I share with the book's author, Laura Fitinghoff. I hope to honor her with my translation and to increase her renown by sharing her wonderful work with a new audience.

Christianity features prominently in the novel, but upon reading it I found that many of its themes resonated with me as an Asatruar. The workings of Wyrd are apparent throughout the story. The children feel their mother watching over them from beyond the grave. The idea of luck being passed from generation to generation in families is also portrayed. A love of and connection to nature is found throughout the book. The protagonists embody many of our virtues including honor, nobility, industriousness, self-reliance, courage, piety, and living joyfully even in the face of hardship. I think our folk will also appreciate the vivid portrayal of Swedish culture.

I hope those of you who chose to read the book enjoy it, and I would love to hear what other connections to Asatru our folk can make.

Cooking for our Folk



Cooking from the Heart. One of the first chefs I worked for told me that there are two main rules to cooking.

- 1. ALWAYS cook from the heart!
- 2. You must know the why of the rule before you can think about breaking it.

To this day, I still believe that number one is the most important; but two is the most valuable lesson. So, for example: why would you add flour to the mix when you are making Fried Potato balls? It doesn't add anything to the dish overall and in fact, it takes away flavor and disrupts texture. The reason is that what flour takes away: is moisture. It adds to the binder and liquid consumption.

So, what does this mean for the folk? Plan and simple, don't take shortcuts. Whenever I pick up the knife and began cooking for the folk, I think of it as channeling the ancestors. Cooking reminds me of that age-old musing "I don't measure seasoning; I wait for the tap on the shoulder from the ancestors to tell me that's enough."

When you cook from the heart, people can tell. Don't cook out of spite or obligation. Cook for the folk because you want to! Find new recipes. Test them. Make them better. And when your heart tells you it is right...time to serve. If you have never made cookies from scratch...make them. Why not? Use the best ingredients you can afford (don't take out a second mortgage for this) but be proud to feed the folk.

Ancestral Food and Culture

Goetta the Store and the Get the Stuff to Make This



Cincinnati is not only a monument to human advancement, but also a historic landmark for German American settlement and culture. Working a blue-collar job and hitting the gym after, this Cincinnati man is always on the hunt for a good source of protein and fuel for my body. Luckily being here in this rich city, I've always had a quick and easy go-to meal for such a purpose... Cincinnati goetta. Here's a simple ingredients list to get you started on the path of a strong Ohio Man.

Meat: Our recipe uses only ground meat, in part because pork hearts and skins are not only polarizing, but hard to come by. Earlier versions of goetta used, as the saying goes, "everything but the oink," and were made not with ground meat, but tougher cuts of pork and pork variety meats that were simmered until fall-apart tender. You still see this variation in some homemade goetta recipes today, but most use ground meat. The pork skin in particular helps make a goetta that's firmer, whereas goetta made with ground meat only is slightly crumbly. You can use all pork, as the original did, but a 50:50 mix of ground beef and ground pork lends a robust flavor. A pork and beef mix is the predominant composition of goetta recipes today.

Oats: Pinhead oats are the historic precedent in Cincinnati. The once-preferred brand was from Dorsel's, a regional mill. There was even a goetta recipe on the back of the bag. Pinhead oats are remarkably similar to steel-cut oats, so if you don't want to special order hard-to-find Dorsel's pinhead oats, use steel-cut.

Seasonings: Bay leaves and onions are nearly required. So is pepper. Dried herbs such as sage show up in nearly every version. Some goetta recipes are quite light on the seasoning, while others go big. I took inspiration from the spice mixes used in traditional German bratwurst recipes and amped it all up for a robust, crave-able flavor.


You are going to be making essentially sausage loafs out of your mixture, preferably refrigerated for one day then cut into thick pieces for cooking up quickly.

Yule at Þórshof




On December 15th, we gathered at Þórshof to kick off our annual Yule celebration. The day was spent in deep spiritual discussion as we prepared the Hof and Terry Rumph Hall for the weekend's celebration. As the Folk trickled in throughout the afternoon, we made ready the toy and coat donations for the charity work the next day, and distributed decorations where they were needed. We capped our day with a powerful Blot to Þórr by Witan Daniel Young and a delicious meal of chili, cornbread, and raw milk prepared by Witan Svan Herul.



Saturday began with a dumbbell workout with Folkbuilder Bethea, followed by a hearty meal of breakfast bowls from Witan Svan. Following breakfast, Folkbuilder Heather Young led the charge in preparing the coat, food, and toy drive. The Hall was buzzing with activity, and all hands pitched in to make it happen. Even the kids busied themselves in giving to the community. Once the kids had warmed up to each other and settled down a little bit, Gothi Rob Stamm marched the little platoon off to the Ve to conduct a children's Blot.



Following breakfast and the charitable work, we enjoyed some outstanding fellowship as more Folk arrived. After a special meal of Witan Daniel Young's beef and veggie soup, Witan Young held a class on prayer, taken from the Sigdrifumal. This was followed almost immediately by a class from Witan Svan Herul on how to properly conduct Blot. Witan Svan broke it down into manageable, easy to understand steps and explained each step in-depth. This was a great benefit to everyone present, but especially to one of our guests who was brand new to Asatru.



After the classes were finished up and darkness had fallen, we cleaned up the Hall and processed into the Ve for Yule Blot to the sound of ringing bells. As we entered the candle lit holy space, the air was thick with the presence of the Aesir. Our Gothar often speak of how, after Blot has been held in one location so many times, the presence of the Gods can be felt there stronger than in more mundane spaces. This is especially true in the home of Asa-Pórr. As Witan Svan began the ritual and sounded three horn blasts to call the Aesir to be among us, the very weight of the air changed.




Once the Aesir had been welcomed amongst us and the need fire was lit, Witan Young lit a candle for each of the members that we have lost in 2023, and the Folk said their names aloud. Some of these members were from our District, and we felt their absence and reflected together on their loss. We also approached the harrow individually and placed candles in the Yule Log for those that couldn't be there with us on that night.



After the rite concluded, we carried the Yule Log and the Yule Bok in solemn procession to the waiting fire behind the Hof where we again formed a circle.



After some words from Witan Svan, the Yule Log was placed into the fire, followed by the Yule Bok to shouts of "Happy Yule!". Our ladies then headed into the Hall, where they prepared candles in anticipation of the sacred flame that our men would carry from the fire to light the first candles of the Yuletide. From this first candle, the Folk would light their candles to carry home with them.



Once we had gathered again in Rumph Hall, tables were cleared, and the clutter of the day was put away to prepare for Sumbel. Half of our present Folk had to depart and put children to bed, but the Folk that remained readied themselves to finish the night with

my favorite ritual. Witan Svan gave a quick class on the purpose and proper conduct of Sumbel for the benefit of the gathered Folk, and then Sumbel commenced. Mothers were remembered, heroes were honored, tears were shed, boasts were made, and a sacred Oath was taken. It's been said many times that these smaller Sumbels are the most intimate, and this night was no exception.








Tis the Season: A NH Yule




From the Sagert family to yours, I hope you had an awesome Yule and I look forward to seeing all of us prosper in the new Year!



Hails from Jaeger!



Hails! My name is Jaeger Croft. Born initially in rural Nebraska to a military family, I am quite the nomad, having moved from place to place during my early life, across state to state. Due to strong roots in the South, most of my family upbringing was done in places like Georgia, Florida, and eventually settling in Western North Carolina, which became my first real home base. I also, by direct way of my maternal grandmother being from England and having a strong affinity for my mainly Germanic roots from southern Germany and the British Isles with secondary Celtic roots, I became a bilingual speaker of both the English and German languages. I had additionally lived briefly in Baden-Würtemberg, Germany, the origin place of my first ancestor baring my last name who moved to the States in the 1600's. Combined with the nomadic early life, I've developed a pretty unique accent speech pattern that isn't easy to pin down.

I am a typically chill well-mannered individual who enjoys the outdoors, camping, hiking, and other such activities, as well as occasional home projects such as beer or mead brewing, map-making, or other small crafts. I can also be into games and also enjoy hang outs with family and friends, whether at the arcade, bar, or at home. I enjoy history and philosophical studies, having briefly gone to school and worked as a Social Studies teacher prior to Covid-19. Now I work more hands on, improving my skills in my new job as Utility, as well as operating heavy equipment.

I always had an interesting religious upbringing, as my parents were not solidly one thing, so there was plenty of flowing between different concepts and ideas, everything from having a largely Southern Baptist family, as well as influences from my parents being into (at different stages in life) Native American beliefs, ancient Summerian religions even as far as "aliens building the pyramids" narratives, minor stuff like Buddhism sprinkles in at some point, back to Christianity, etc. As such, you could say I never grew up with a sense of spiritual grounding in a solid singular tradition, but it did allow for me to be open to the concept of multiple paths for different peoples. Combined with my natural affinity to be attached to my specific heritage, and a belief that every people had their own unique spiritual reality, I began looking into the question of "if everyone has their own Gods and beliefs, who are my people's Gods?" Naturally this led to me becoming essentially Asatru, before even knowing the term itself, often simply calling it Heathen or Germanic Religion, but also was for a time "dual-religious", sitting in between Christianity and Germanic religion as a sorta "Christo-Pagan/Heathen-Christian", believing it more historically accurate to Western Civilization than the current "Judeo-Christian" one.

I found myself more and more simply just Asatru, however, and after about five years of solitary practice, I found the AFA and joined, hesitant and cautious at first, not knowing what exactly I was getting into, but quickly learned I was where I needed to be and am grateful that I made that decision. Now, after a time of being a regular practitioner, being involved as much as I can in the maintenance of Hof functions and events, I decided to make it a little more official by becoming an Apprentice Folkbuilder, hoping only that I am able to live up to the task and do my duty. Hail the Gods! Hail the Folk! Hail the AFA!

The first ritual of Yule is performed in honor of the rising sun. The old passes away and the new is reborn, the sun ends its journey and begins to grow again.



What Does it Mean to Be a Member of the Asatru Folk Assembly?



What does it mean to be a member of the AFA? As described in our mission statement: "It's about roots. it's about connection. it's about coming home." Yet some of our Folk are still sitting on the fence and wonder whether the hype lives up to the reality. Well, I come to you bearing wonderful news:

It does.

My first national event was Winter Nights at Sigrheim. I brought a man with me whom I had met in an AFA Men's Video chat. My journey to the Home of Tyr with a man I had never met ended up being one of the most profound experiences of my life. I was overwhelmed by the warm welcome, and by the solid men and women of our folk in attendance. Also, the chance to meet and talk to the Leadership, the doers, and the givers among our beautiful Folk and the many beautiful children, running and playing in this sacred space that the AFA has manifested was completely Inspiring. I was home. Finally home.

After Wayfarer's Blot, I asked one of our Witan to take up the position of Apprentice Folkbuilder. I was given the position, and here we are. The responsibility of this position cannot be understated. I sometimes fear I'm derelict in my duties. I work 60+ hours a week at my "day" job, and I'm in the middle of a vicious legal custody battle for my daughter. Life is not easy at the moment, by any definition. But I have found solace and strength in our gods, our folk, and the AFA.

I'm now a member of Stonewall Kindred. Last month, I met with Pat and Thomas for a hike up a mountain at Harpers Ferry, West Virginia. I had met with one for the AFA Eldri, Thomas, beforehand. I found him incredibly knowledgeable, and we've become

fast friends. It was my first time meeting Pat, who took the Folkbuilder's Oath a while ago. He was also an amazing man to interact with as we hiked up the ancient hills above the Potomac River. I found Pat to be a solid, knowledgeable man. The conversation flowed easily between us as we made our way along the mountain trail.

We reached the peak and unpacked for our Blót. We toasted to the ancestors, the gods, and the heroes of our folk. As we commenced the Blót, curious hikers stopped to observe for a while before moving on. A few of them complimented Pat on his horn — the Ceremonial Horn of Stonewall Kindred. Pat thanked them for the compliments and wished them well on their respective paths.

As always, Blót with the Folk was an empowering and moving experience. After a period of meditation, we packed up and began to hike back down the mountain. While we slowly, and reluctantly, returned to the mundane world, we spoke to each other about the lives of our heroic folk of old. Those lost in Harper's Ferry during the Civil War on both sides of that conflict, and why there should be no more "Brother Wars" between our people. Never again. Never, ever again.

We eventually got back to town and found a local restaurant. We were escorted to a quiet, corner table by a waitress, and proceeded to continue our multi-layered conversation covering many topics for what seemed like hours.

But eventually, the setting sun called our attention to the world that awaited our return. So, reluctantly, we had to say our goodbyes and parted company. But I was not yet done with Harper's Ferry.

I work a high-stress job just outside of Washington, DC, and get very few days off. So, I used the occasion to return to the mountain trail and camp out for the night high above the Potomac River where three states — Virginia, West Virginia, and Maryland come together. A badly needed time of solitude and self-reflection. A time to commune with the Gods and connect with the spirits that inhabit the land. A needed escape from the noise and chaos of the city that's essential for my mental and spiritual health.

I hiked about five miles on the Appalachian Trail as darkness fell and gradually became the deep dark of night as I reflected on the day. A feeling of gratitude slowly bubbled up within me. Gratitude for connecting with the Gods of my Ancestors, all those generations that came before me, and, of course, the AFA. It was an indescribable feeling, as are all truly spiritual moments.

Eventually, I found an idyllic location, made camp, ate, and fell asleep as soon as I got

into my sleeping bag. Just the trees, the night sky, and my dreams for companionship. And it was good.

My journey, so far, in the AFA has been amazing. The knowledge that I'm not alone, that I have the folk and our gods to lean on, and the reality that no matter where I may wander, climb, run, walk, crawl, or stumble, there will be folk willing to share home and hearth with me. And knowing that brings me peace.

The AFA has changed my life in more ways than a single article can adequately explain. The more involved I become, the more of our Folk I meet, the more I recognize that I'm home, truly home.

OWPD - Harpers Ferry, MD



Getting a head start on our New Year's resolutions this season and taking advantage of the fact that the 9th of the month fell on a Saturday, we observed December's Odin World Prayer Day in the historic town of Harpers Ferry, WV. The steep climb up the Maryland Heights Loop was strenuous enough, even without the heavy millstone we carried (pictured), which Stonewall Kindred has been using as an altar stone for four years.

The challenge of the extra weight was important. It was part of the ritual. The Horn is raised, and the Mead is poured in offering to Wotan - but the true Gift, that which our Rune Master desires most, is our devotion, which we express through the physical exertion we put ourselves through.



Our Blót to the High One was given at the site of the Union naval artillery battery on the Maryland Heights Loop, a hasty fighting position that was active during Stonewall Jackson's campaign there in 1862. While we drew the interest of many passers-by on the trail, our fellow travelers recognized the sacred nature of our Rite and respectfully kept their distance.




Odin World Prayer Day is observed on the Ninth of every month. I encourage our Folk around the world to join us in this holy undertaking of concentrated spiritual Will.
